MATCH PREVIEW

Wednesday night marks the first-ever meeting between expansion San Diego Wave Fútbol Club (3-0-0) and Racing Louisville FC (0-1-2). Wave FC will aim for their fourth straight victory to begin their inaugural campaign, while Louisville is still in search of their first win. A fourth straight win by Wave FC would have them match 2017 North Carolina Courage as the only other expansion club to rattle off four consecutive victories to begin an inaugural National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) campaign. That 2017 Courage club, which featured current Wave FC defender Abby Dahlkemper, went 16-7-1 in the regular season and advanced all the way to the NWSL Championship where they lost 1-0 to Portland Thorns FC.

With the Wave defeating Houston 1-0 and NJ/NY Gotham FC 4-0 to open their inaugural campaign, they became the first NWSL club in history to begin their expansion season with back-to-back shutouts.

This will be Racing Louisville's first-ever meeting against a club from California. They also enter Wednesday's match against the Wave having won only once in their last 15 regular season matches (1-7-7). During that stretch, Racing has only scored two goals or more in a match on two occasions. Their sole victory in the 15-match stretch came on October 16, 2021 when they took down the Orlando Pride 3-1 at home. Current Wave players Jodie Taylor, Alex Morgan, Taylor Kornieck and Emily van Egmond were suited up for the Pride on that night, with Taylor scoring the lone goal for Orlando.

San Diego and Louisville have faced common opponents in the 2022 regular season. Racing lost to Chicago 2-1 and tied Houston 1-1, whereas Wave defeated Chicago 2-1 and Houston 1-0.

San Diego defender Kaleigh Riehl, who was acquired in the 2022 NWSL Expansion Draft from Racing, leads Wave FC in clearances (11), is tied for the team lead in blocks (2) and contributed what ended up being the game-winning goal (89th minute) in San Diego's 2-1 victory over Chicago on 5/15.

Upon the selection of Riehl with the ninth and final pick of the Expansion Draft, James O'Connor, Racing's executive vice president of development, was quoted saying "We are really disappointed to lose Kaleigh. She is a terrific professional, and we wish her every success in the future." Riehl appeared in 21 games during Racing's inaugural 2021 season and ranked sixth on the team in minutes (1,684).

NWSL scoring leader Alex Morgan (five goals) enters the match against Louisville currently ranked fourth all-time in regular season shots on goal (175), sixth in total shots (320) and tied for sixth in goals (43). Two matches ago, she scored an NWSL career-high four goals in the 4-0 win over Gotham FC on 5/7, joining Kristen Hamilton and Sam Kerr as the only trio of athletes to attain that feat in the league.

LAST WAVE FC MATCH: MAY 15TH / SAN DIEGO WAVE FC 2 CHICAGO RED STARS 1

San Diego Wave Fútbol Club (3-0-0) won their third-straight match to begin their inaugural season, 2-1, over the Chicago Red Stars (1-1-0) in front of 5,000 fans on 5/15 at Torero Stadium. Alex Morgan converted a penalty kick in the 56th minute for her fifth goal in her last two matches, while Kaleigh Riehl added what turned out to be the game-winner in the 89th minute off of a set piece from Kelsey Turnbow.

Wave FC, who recorded back-to-back shutouts to begin the season, held the Chicago Red Stars scoreless until a 90th minute goal by Ava Cook brought the margin to one. San Diego's defense overall held Chicago to nine total shots, only three of which were on frame. Conversely, the Wave FC attack racked up 19 shots and were consistent in their high attack. Sofia Jakobsson pushed the Red Stars defense to the breaking point early in the second half when she drew a foul in the box to set up Morgan's penalty kick goal for the lead.

ALEX MORGAN KEEPS SCORING

Alex Morgan currently leads all of NWSL with five goals, three ahead of the next closest individuals (Racing Louisville's Jessica McDonald and OL Reign's Tziarra King both have two goals apiece). Morgan, who has 43 career NWSL goals, is currently tied for sixth all-time on the regular season scoring list with Carli Lloyd. Lloyd tallied 43 goals in 107 career appearances, while Morgan will be making her 106th appearance on Wednesday night in Louisville. SCORING FIRST

Over the course of the six preseason matches in the Challenge Cup, the Wave only ever scored first once (win vs. Angel City on 4/2, Jodie Taylor 19'). However, in three regular season matches they've scored first each time against Houston, NJ/NY Gotham FC and Chicago (all victories).

SHERIDAN HAS SEEN HISTORY BEFORE

Kailen Sheridan has been the winning goalkeeper in two of the three best individual scoring efforts by an NWSL player. She recorded a shutout for San Diego in Alex Morgan's career-best four-goal outburst on 5/7 vs. Gotham FC, as well as found herself the winning keeper when Sam Kerr scored four goals for Sky Blue FC in a 5-4 victory on August 19, 2017. It was Kerr's fourth and final goal in second-half stoppage time that was the winning difference.

As unique as Sheridan's place in that history is, she's written some of her own in the 2022 regular season by recording a career-high tying back-to-back shutouts to begin the season and then nearly holding Chicago scoreless until the Red Stars scored in the 90th minute on 5/15. In the two shutouts to begin the year, she fended off 19 total shots and made six saves. The last and only time she's matched such an accomplishment was to open her 2021 campaign with NJ/NY Gotham FC when they turned in back-to-back shutouts against the Houston Dash and Chicago Red Stars. Sheridan, who was named to NWSL's Best XI in 2021, has begun the 2022 campaign with an 88.9% save success rate.

HOME OPENER VICTORY - WIN NO. 2

Playing on their front foot for all 90-plus minutes, San Diego Wave Fútbol Club (2-0-0) shutout NJ/NY Gotham FC (1-1-0) 4-0 in front of 5,000 energetic fans at Torero Stadium on 5/7. Alex Morgan scored an NWSL career-high four goals, converting PKs in first-half stoppage time and again in the 66th minute, followed by a left-footed laser in the 70th, and a crafty finish in second-half stoppage time. Goalkeeper Kailen Sheridan also had a standout performance, proving stingy against her former club with four saves on the way to recording her second-consecutive clean sheet.

Wave FC set the tone from the first whistle, aggressively creating scoring opportunities, dominating with a 31-to-8 shot advantage, and shutting down Gotham FC's attack with a swarming defense. Captain Abby Dahlkemper left the match in the 35th minute after suffering an injury, however, Head Coach Casey Stoney stated in her post-match interview that Dahlkemper was in stable condition

INAUGURAL HISTORY MADE IN TEXAS - WIN NO. 1

San Diego Wave Fútbol Club (1-0-0) used late-game heroics in their inaugural NWSL regular season match to secure a 1-0 shutout victory against the Houston Dash (0-1-0) at PNC Stadium on May 1st. The first three points in club history were secured in the 86th minute by rookie Mia Gyau's cross into the box that Katie Johnson headed over to Jodie Taylor, who drove her first touch into the back of the net. Goalkeeper Kailen Sheridan led a stingy Wave FC defense, fending off 11 shots from the Dash and picking up two saves. One of the key moments came in the 44th minute when Houston's Rachel Daly found a clear lane inside the box off a cross, but Sheridan got enough of a touch to redirect the shot off the top crossbar.

Sofia Jakobsson had the earliest scoring chance for Wave FC, finding herself one-on-one with Dash goalkeeper Jane Campbell in the seventh minute. The Houston keeper denied the left-footed attempt with her left hand and then had teammate Marisa Viggiano race in to block Jakobsson's open-goal follow up. That initial opportunity was San Diego's only shot on goal until Jodie Taylor's game-winner in the 86th minute. Six Wave FC players made their NWSL regular season debut in the victory. Naomi Girma, Kelsey Turnbow and Belle Briede were in the Starting XI, while Mia Gyau, Marleen Schimmer and Amirah Ali came on as substitutes.

Jodie Taylor's game-winning goal in the win over Houston was her 32nd career NWSL goal. It is the second time Taylor has scored in her first regular season match with a team (also 2018 OL Reign) and the goal was the 13th game-winner of her career. A TALE OF THE CHALLENGE CUP

The expansion Wave FC put together a 1-3-2 record during the 2022 National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) Challenge Cup, picking up their sole victory on April 2nd in a 4-2 win over Angel City FC. Alex Morgan led the club with four goals (T-4th in NWSL) over the course of the six preseason matches, while also tying for the league lead in shots on goal (13).

A total of 19 players saw action for the Wave over the course of the Challenge Cup. Christen Westphal was the only one to see action in every minute of the preseason (six starts, 540 minutes), while rookie Naomi Girma followed closely with 475 minutes (five starts). Other rookies to see action over the course of the six matches were Belle Briede (one goal, one assist), Marleen Schimmer (one assist) and Taylor Hansen. Both forward Sofia Jakobsson (327 minutes) and goalkeeper Carly Telford (two starts) received their first taste of NWSL action after extensive professional careers abroad.

Wave FC was outscored 9-4 by their opponents in the first half of six Challenge Cup matches, whereas they held a 5-2 scoring advantage in the second half. Six of those nine first-half goals allowed by Wave FC came within the first 13 minutes of play.

SHARING THE SCORING WEALTH IN CHALLENGE CUP

Six players accounted for San Diego's nine goals over the course of Challenge Cup play. Two of those were from rookies Amirah Ali and Belle Briede, whereas the others to join the scoring were Alex Morgan (four goals), Jodie Taylor (one), Kaleigh Riehl (one) and Taylor Kornieck (one).

All nine Wave FC goals came from inside the box. Wave's seven goals during the 2022 regular season have all also come from inside the penalty area. Morgan has accounted for nine of the 16 total goals.

Six different players recorded a Challenge Cup assist: Marleen Schimmer, Christen Westphal, Belle Briede, Taylor Kornieck, Alex Morgan and Kelsey Turnbow.

Kornieck, Belle Briede and Alex Morgan were the only three Wave players during the Challenge Cup to tally at least one goal and an assist.

BIG FOLLOWING IN STADIUM AND ACROSS AIRWAVES

Over three preseason home matches, San Diego Wave FC drew 17,158 total fans and recorded two sellouts. The average 5,720 per-match-attendance (Torero Stadium capacity is 6,000) ranked third among all teams.

In a battle between the two 2022 NWSL expansion clubs, San Diego picked up their first win in club history with a 4-2 decision against Angel City FC on April 2nd in the NWSL Challenge Cup. The match, which was broadcast nationally on CBS, drew an television audience of 456,000 viewers and ranked amongst other notable leagues such as the Premier League and MLS, while outperforming nationally-televised NHL games that same weekend. The powerful viewership has since led to Wave FC earning two additional CBS national broadcasts during the 2022 regular season. The first of the two will come on June 19th at NJ/NY Gotham FC, with the next occurring on September 10th at Washington Spirit. The three total slots on CBS national are the most amongst all NWSL clubs this season.

WRITING HISTORY FOR THEIR ALMA MATER

Midfielder Marleen Schimmer (Grand Canyon University) and defender Taylor Hansen (University of Montana) are the first players in their respective school's history to play in the NWSL.

Schimmer, who was drafted ninth overall by the Wave in the National Women's Soccer League Draft, was named 2021 WAC Offensive Player of the Year and made the All-WAC first team after leading GCU to the program's first WAC regular-season title, first WAC Tournament championship and first NCAA tournament appearance (source: GCU). During her two years with GCU, she set new school records in goals (17), assists (18), points (52), shots attempted and shots on goal.

Hansen, who made the club as a non-roster invitee, was a two-time All-Big Sky Conference defender with 92 matches played (1st in school history) and 81 starts (2nd in school history) over her four years. She scored three goals for the Grizzlies and ranks sixth in program history with 15 assists.

INTERNATIONAL DUTY CALLS

In recent weeks, Wave FC has had five players head off for international duty: Abby Dahlkemper and Naomi Girma (USA), Kailen Sheridan (Canada), Sofía Jakobsson (SWE), and Emily Van Egmond (AUS).

For the 21-year-old Girma, whom Wave FC selected with the No. 1 overall pick in the 2022 NWSL Draft out of Stanford University, it marked her first international cap with the U.S. Women's National Team. Previously in her career, she captained the U-20 Women's National Team and also had runs with the U-19 and U-17 National Teams.

NEW KID ON THE BLOCK

San Diego Wave Fútbol Club is the 12th and newest member of the NWSL. The club's vision is to be a force for good through the game we love and is led by President Jill Ellis, former head coach of the US Women's National Team (USWNT) and two-time World Cup champion. Together with Head Coach Casey Stoney, the club will bring the highest level of world-class, professional soccer to San Diego. USWNT standouts Alex Morgan and Abby Dahlkemper were two of the first players signed to the club that consists of athletes representing six international soccer federations, including US, Mexico, Canada, Sweden, England and Australia. The team will play home matches during its inaugural season at their temporary home, University of San Diego's Torero Stadium, before moving into their permanent home at Snapdragon Stadium (completion of construction scheduled for September 2022). Their first home match at Snapdragon Stadium is scheduled for Saturday, September 17th vs. Angel City FC.

CASEY STONEY, HEAD COACH

Casey was named head coach of San Diego Wave Fútbol Club, the 12th and newest franchise of the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL), on July 14, 2021.

Prior to joining the Wave FC and the NWSL, Stoney served as Manager of Manchester United Women. There she led Manchester United to 52 wins in 77 competitive matches and secured promotion with the 2018-19 Football Association Women's Championship title in her inaugural season with the club. The team finished 4th in the 2019-20 and 2020-21 campaigns in the FA WSL, coming within a single point of qualifying for the Champions League in her last year with the club.

As a player, Stoney is the former captain of England, earning 130 international caps between 2000-2017, leading the team to a semifinal appearance at UEFA Women's Euro 2017 and playing in three World Cups ('07, '11, '15). Additionally, she played for Great Britain at the 2012 London Olympics helping them reach the guarterfinals.



Stoney began her club career at 12 years old with Chelsea Ladies before moving to Arsenal Ladies in 1999. Stoney joined Charlton Athletic Ladies in 2002 captaining the team and leading them to their first FA Women's Cup final. In July 2007, Stoney re-signed with Chelsea and served as player-manager for a portion of the 2009 season, giving her a taste of what was to come. In 2010 she signed with FA WSL club Lincoln, before returning to Arsenal in 2014. Stoney's finished her illustrious 19-year professional career at Liverpool from 2016-18.

Stoney prides herself on a coaching style that empowers players to be decision makers, and intimately understands the pressure and emotion of playing at the highest level. Determined to provide support for her team both on and off the pitch, Stoney strives to create a high-performance environment that fosters the open communication and supportive relationships.

Morgan is one of the most decorated players in women's soccer history. She is a two-time World Cup champion, Olympic gold medalist, UEFA Champions League winner and NWSL league champion. The prolific goal scorer and inventive playmaker makes the move back to Southern California, where she grew up and began her trailblazing career, and will make an immediate impact for the franchise both on and off the field.

How Acquired: In one of the most high-profile deals in NWSL history, Wave FC announced the signing of the world-renowned forward Alex Morgan via trade with Orlando Pride in Nov. '21.

Professional: Morgan was the first overall pick in the 2011 WPS Draft by the Western New York Flash where she propelled the club to the regular season title and WPS Championship that same year. In 2013 Morgan joined the Portland Thorns FC during the NWSL's inaugural season. She assisted on the second goal in the championship match to capture the first title in league history. In 2016, Morgan was traded from Portland Thorns to Orlando Pride and signed a six-month contract in 2017 with French club Lyon, where she won the French and Champions League titles in the same year. Morgan went on loan with Tottenham Hotspur Football Club, more commonly known as Spurs from September – December of 2021. To close out 2021, she joined the San Diego Wave FC for their inaugural season in a trade with the Orlando Pride.

International: In her decorated career with the U.S. National Team, Morgan has netted 115 goals in 190 appearances. She also played a key role with the USA securing the 2015 and 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup titles, being named to the Dream Team for both tournaments and winning the Silver Boot in 2019. Among other international soccer accolades, Morgan was the 2012 U.S. Soccer Female Athlete of the Year and a 2012 FIFA World Player of the Year Finalist. A testament to her leadership, Morgan co-captained the U.S. from 2018-2020.

Morgan first joined the senior National Team in 2010 and was the youngest player on the 2011 FIFA Women's World Cup squad where they finish second, losing on penalties in the final against Japan.
